

Being a Deacon When I was made a Deacon by the

Bishop of Ballarat in 1957 the Diaconate was regarded as merely a stepping stone to the Priesthood.

As a result there was not much effort to develop a distinctive role for a Deacon although there was a good description in the ordination service, which included some liturgical and some pastoral care activities.

There was also an assumption at that time, which is still held by some people in this Diocese, that you have to be male to be a deacon.

It was this last situation which was changed at the recent Session of the Diocesan Synod when it adopted the General Synod Ordination of Women to the Office of Deacon Canon 1985.

As is obvious from the title this was passed at General Synod a very long time ago and the Diocese of The Murray is the last Diocese of the Australian Church to adopt it.

However it does not mean that the Bishop **must** ordain a woman to be a deacon—rather that he **can** if he believes that it is right.

Synod has not adopted the Canon which would allow the Bishop to ordain a woman to the priesthood so there will have to be some thought given to defining the role of a Deacon who will not necessarily be going on to become a priest.

This programme was written and introduced to the Mothers' Union in Australia by Kate and Ian Pearse in 2005 and embodies all that Mothers' Union members are called to do:

"Sharing Christ's love by encouraging, strengthening and supporting marriage and family life"

Recently the program has been updated to include YouTube and Power Point presentations, and is now known as "Families Equip" (FE).

The aim of this five-week program, run by Liz Hampel, the Mothers' Union Diocesan Facilitator, is to encourage and support parents in their important role, through the education and discussion of family issues and skills in a relaxed and friendly environment.

- Relationship building (through the key areas of listening and encouragement)
- ② Children's resilience
- Discipline strategies
- © Family growth

Recently a program was held at the Neighbourhood Centre in Strathalbyn. It was the first ever men only group ever to be held in Australia with five participants ranging in age from early 30s to late 50s. The wealth of their combined experience and their willingness to share it, led to in depth discussions made possible by the structure of the Families Equip course and the knowledge that their personal information will remain strictly confidential.



Within the past few weeks a second program has been held in Strathalbyn, this time at the House of Hospitality in East Terrace.

Six Mums participated for these five sessions, the Strathalbyn Mothers' Union providing an 'on site' crèche for the children each week.



This five week, two hour program is offered at no cost to the participants, with all expenses being covered by the Mothers' Union, who also provide refreshments midway through the weekly sessions.
