

#### IS JESUS WELCOME?



The challenge for us today is whether we have room in our hearts and in our lives for Jesus.

There is even a question whether there is still room for Jesus in our celebration of Christmas.

One of the commentators writing about John the Baptist and his call to repentance in preparation for the coming of the Messiah even suggested that we have much to repent for in the way in which we celebrate Jesus' birth.

Certainly, if what you see in the shops and in the media is any guide, there is very little mention of Jesus in the contemporary celebration of Christmas.

But how far is our own celebration centred upon Jesus the Messiah. Are we too busy to recognise who Jesus is and say "no room" or do we take him in—into our worship and by our acts of love, into our hearts?

### The Church of St John the Evangelist

St John's Church, Langhorne Creek was opened in 1929, the culmination of a great deal of fund-raising while services were being held in the Oddfellows' Hall

The land was purchased in 1913 for £30 but it was not until 1924 that steps were taken raise enough money to pay for a suitable building.

At last on Saturday 8 June 1929 the foundation stone was laid by Sir Lancelot Stirling in the presence of a large crowd.

Five months later, on the 2 November 1929 the completed building was dedicated by the Bishop of Adelaide, the Right Reverend A. N. Thomas. The Rector at the time was the Reverend H. Woolnough. The Architect was Mr C. E. Boyce from Tranmere.



Now ninety-one years later the congegation has declined in numbers and this has led to the decision to suspend regular services in the church.

Our thanks go to Mrs Marlene Potts who as Churchwarden and Organiste has been responsible for the care of the church in recent years as well as providing a welcome cuppa after the service.

## **Beryl Celebrates One Hundred Years**

Beryl Jean Ackroyd was born on the 31 December 1920 in the Sydney suburb of South Kensington. Her parents were Percy and Adelina Ackroyd and she was sister to Jack.

While her mother was in hospital Percy bought a hotel in Shellharbour, south of Sydney, and in the next seven years she lived in seven different hotels.

The family finally settled in Woonona on the NSW south coast where Percy owned a Billiard Room and an SP Betting Shop.

Beryl attended the local primary school and won a scholarship to go to High school, after which she went to the Wollongong TAFE to study Needlework. This led to her career as a teacher of Needlework in both primary and high schools.

Beryl married Edwin Merrick in September 1942 and they moved to Corrimal to live in the large family house of Eddie's grandmother, "Harbinger Hall" while they built their own home. They moved there in 1949, along with their five year old daughter, Diane.

This was home until they decided to downsize in 1997. Eddie died in 1998 so three years later Beryl made another move to be near Diane in Stathalbyn.



Her life has been full since then, joining Probus, Mothers' Union, Garden Club and U3A.

In her words, "Looking back I can say I had a very happy childhood. We were never very short of money. I was very spoilt and was given many wonderful privileges which I didn't always take advantage of.

"Since moving to Strathalbyn my life has been full. I have 1 daughter, 2 grandsons, 4 great-grandchildren, 3 step-great-grandchildren and now 2 partners to great-grandchildren. So my life is full and never dull."

# Deet the Core Angels




