

It was very disturbing to see the way in which the recent reports in "The Sunday Mail" have belittled two fine people, Mrs Joan Correll and Fr Thomas Karamakuzhiyil, by the use of emotive language and innuendo.

Mrs Correll's family must be dismayed to find someone who was described in the article as "a forthright wealthy widow" and who by the evidence of her will must have been a fine business woman with a generous heart now depicted as a feeble old lady who could be pressured into acting in a certain way. The Mail's claim "The Sunday Mail does not suggest Fr Thomas pressured Mrs Correll to change her will, or her power of attorney." doesn't stand up when you read the rest of the articles.

Many people in Mount Barker and this parish will have been upset at the way in which Fr Thomas has been treated as so many of them have benefited by his help which has not just been kind words but very real help to those who have lost property in bush fires, international students suffering as a result of the pandemic or the homeless and hungry folk in Mt Barker.

It was also very sad to see that the enthusiasm to put the worst possible interpretation on their relationship blinded the author from recognizing the caring heart revealed by the details of her Will which led to her desire to provide for the care of the needy even after she was gone. —*Editor*

Fr Daniel Looks Back & Forward

In terms of my personal ministry throughout 2021, it was for the most part rather complex as I struggled to come to terms with the growing reality that I would have to look elsewhere for ministry and fulfillment in 2022.

I have spent a lot of my time focused on completing my master's in theological studies, which I did, majoring in biblical and early Christian studies.

My final research project on examining the prophetic imagination that is recalled through the parable of Lazarus and the Rich Man, particularly its call to serve God through living in justice and love, was received with a distinction grade.

With the Bishop's permission, I worked part time as a school-chaplain, filling this role at Meningie Area School. I found this position quite rewarding and was able to build significant relationships with many students..

However, it was only 10 hours a week and once I was informed that there was to be no funded ministry position within the diocese to move to, I had to look to secure a means of support for Jasamine and myself, as well as our expected baby, who may or may not have arrived by the time this report is tabled.

As such, I have accepted a teaching position at Coomandook for 2022. I am thankful to Bishop Keith for allowing me to be able to continue in the role of MU Chaplain and hold a PTO within the diocese, which has already been exercised a number of times in the parishes.


