

#### Advent 2022

The Statement from the Heart came out of the most extensive consultation of First Nations people ever. To gain the agreement of such a diversity of people from all over Australia, urban and remote, from the centre to the Torres Strait, is an extraordinary thing.

The Statement is also beautifully written, concise, powerful and deep. It speaks into our understanding of what it is to be Australian and what it is to be an Australian church and it has been endorsed by both the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Anglican Council and the National Aboriginal Bishop.

All this means that Australians generally, and the church in particular, need to listen very carefully to it. Scripture teaches us to pay particular attention to voices crying in the Wilderness.

Any prophetic call is likely to be strange and Challenging. But it may also be the way to hear the voice of God for our time.

Five years ago on 2017 the Anglican Church of Australia responded to the historic Statement from the Heart and General Synod supported the call for a constitutionally-entrenched First Nations' Voice to the Commonwealth Parliament and asked the Public Affairs Commission to prepare resources in consultation with the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Anglican Council.

#### 16 Days of Activism

# Beryl Jean Merrick née Ackroyd, 1920-2022



Beryl was born in South Kensington, a Sydney suburb on the 31st December 1920 and even before her mother Adelina

had time to bring her home her father Percy had bought the first of a series of hotels in country NSW which would be home for her over the next seven years.

They then moved to Woonona, a suburb of Wollongong and she attended the local primary school before gaining a scholarship to Wollongong High School. She began studying dressmaking at TAFE but did not complete the course due to the outbreak of WW2.

She met Eddie Merrick at a dance in 1938. In 1942 when they were thinking of marriage Eddie asked her if she would like an engagement ring or a block of land. She chose the land but they went to the Randwick Races on the Queen's Birthday in 1942 and Eddie had a good win — so she was able to have the engagement ring as well.

They were married on the 4th September 1943 and Beryl's brother Jack who was in the Airforce was posted to Darwin two days before the wedding.

Eddie's sister Peggy, the Bridesmaid, who was in the Navy was more fortunate. She arrived just three hours before the service was due to start.

Dianne was born when they lived with Beryl's Grannie while their house was being built and the family was able to move into it in June 1949. It was to be their home for forty-nine years.

Beryl started teaching needlework, at first part-time and then, on the head-master's recommendation, full time.

Eddie died in June 1998 and Beryl moved to Strathalbyn in March 2001. She loved the town and joined a number of different organizations.

She especially enjoyed being with her family and would travel far and wide to watch her great-grandchildren playing their sport. She is greatly missed by all her friends and especially by the members of her family.
